TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[Reported for the Richmond Dispatch.]

South Carolina Legislature--Exciting Debate--10,000 Volunteers to be Raised--Speeches of Judge McGrath, Mr. Yancey and others--Minute Men--&c., &c.
CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 11.--Mr. DeSaure, from the Committee of Ways and Means, reported a bill recommending the postponement of the act requiring the banks to have one-third gold and silver in their vaults for two-thirds of their whole issue. It was unanimously adopted.

The necessity of prompt action for the relief of the banks was strongly urged.

It is reported that expresses are daily bringing bills from the surrounding States, and other demands for specie are daily being made.

A bill will be introduced to provide police in relation to persons coming from States hostile to the South.

Mr. Aldrich made a report from the Committee on Federal Relations, amending the Senate bill calling a convention of the people of the State, and recommend that an election be held on the 6th of December, instead of January, and that the Convention meet on the 17th of December, instead of the 10th of January.

Mr. Black opposed the amendment. He wanted more time to canvass, and preferred the bill as it stood.

Mr. Thompson said the agriculturists residing in the upper counties wanted more time.

Mr. Winslow interrupted Mr. Thompson with a resolution relative to declaring an opinion on the part of South Carolina, and inviting the co-operation of other States, which was tabled.

The bill thus amended passed unanimously, after an exciting debate, in which it was said that all had favored the Senate bill, but developments had been made within the last twenty-five hours which made decided action necessary.

Telegraphic messages were constantly receiving calling upon them to act.

The Senate also unanimously concurred in the amendments.

It is expected that Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Texas and Mississippi will go with South Carolina.

In the House a resolution was offered, to be considered Monday, that the Governor raise 10,000 volunteers.

Saturday evening a crowd of two thousand persons assembled in front of the Congress House. The Minute men turned out and marched down Main street, amid a great display of fire-works.

Judge McGrath and Messrs. Conner, Colcock and Cunningham delivered addresses--Mr. McGrath remarked that the people, the Legislature and Heaven say that South Carolina has a right to secede. If the Government at Washington says she has not, then prove it by taking the right away. Mr. Colcock said that, although the present crowd was a large one, he wished to see one more person present, and that was Abraham Lincoln. He would take him by the hand, bring him to the platform, and tell him to look upon that crowd, and then ask him if he ever expected to wave the sceptre of President over their heads. He said he had no doubt that "honest old Abe" would answer with downcast eyes, "Never!"

Augusta, Ga., Nov. 10.--The Minute Men's meeting adjourned after hearing exciting speeches. They appointed a delegation of ten Minute Men to attend a Military Convention, to be held next week at Milledgeville. They were greatly rejoiced to hear that South Carolina had passed the bill for the meeting of a Convention at Montgomery, Ala., on the 10th of December.

Mr. Yancey addressed an enthusiastic meeting to-night in Estell Hall, in this place.

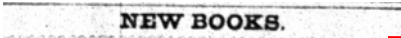

COMMERCIAL.

The New York Journal of Commerce of Saturday afternoon has the following:

We regret to notice increased disquietude in financial circles, and the tone of levity and ridicule with which our political troubles have been treated in certain quarters, does not prove to be particularly re-assuring to the public mind. There is no scarcity of money, but rates are very unequal, while the chief difficulty is less in the rate than in the disposition to transact business on any terms, which is everywhere apparent. The rapid decline in Stocks since the election has induced lenders upon these securities to call in their loans, for fear of losing their margin, and this has added to the prevailing excitement.

Foreign Exchange is very irregular, and unsaleable at any reasonable price. Prime bills equal to leading bankers at 60 days on London, were sold this morning from second hands at 107 1/4, and there were no buyers of the best sterling at anything over 107 1/4.

The stock market gave evidence of a continued panic, the decline having continued, and the business was limited less by the want of eagerness on the part of sellers than the backwardness of buyers, the latter having it very much their own way. North Carolina State 6's advanced 1/4. We notice the following additional declines from the lowest rates at either Board yesterday: U. S. 5's of 1874 declined 2; Missouri 6's 1/4; California 7's 2; Ill. Cen. bds. 1; La Crosse and Mo. bds. 1; Penn. Coal 1; Pacific Mail 1/4; New York Central 1/4, recovering 1/4; Erie 2; Hudson River 1/4; Harlem 1; Harlem Pref. 1/4; Reading 2/4; Michigan Central 2 3/4; Michigan Southern 1, on old stock, and 1/4 on preferred; Ill. Cen. scrip 2/4; Galena and Chicago 2 1/4; Cleveland and Toledo 1/4, recovering 1/4; Chicago and Rock Island 1/4; Chicago, Burlington and Quincy 2/4; Mil. and Miss. I. In a few cases the decline was greater than quoted, the closing sale being, occasionally, a fraction above the last point.
